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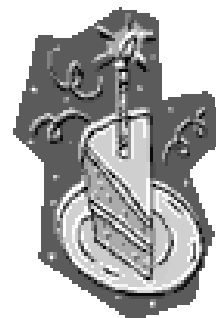
RE-ACCREDITATION SUCCESSFUL!!!

The undergraduate degree program in Park and Recreation Management was re-accredited at the National Recreation and Park Association annual conference in San Antonio, TX, on October 17th. The NRPA Accreditation Board met with Drs. Jim Gilbert, PRM Director, and Linda Chitwood, Dean of the School of Applied Sciences, to review the recommendations made in April of 2005 by the state site evaluator Dr. Dennis Nelson (Utah State). To be re-accredited is extremely important to the

students as once they graduate they are eligible to sit for the certification examination without having to be employed for 5 years in the leisure/recreation profession. Today, many municipal recreation departments require and applicant to hold the Certified Park and Recreation Professional (CPRP) or be eligible to become certified. The recertification study is a rigorous process that requires [extensive](#) documentation to verify Ole Miss' program met or exceeded the NRPA standards. With a few minor corrections to be completed by September of 2006, the Park and Recrea-

tion Management degree remains stable and academically strong. Dr. Nelson, in remarks about Ole Miss, said, "Congratulations on your successful accreditation bid...I'm glad everything worked out. I had no doubts that they wouldn't."

Mr. Randy Lavender came to speak to Dr. Dupper's PRM 362 class. If any of the students had any misconceptions, such as people in wheelchairs are helpless, then they definitely learned something during that class period.

Mr. Lavender is the Regional Coordinator for Disabilities and the Physically Challenged for 12 counties in Mississippi.

Mr. Lavender lives down that reputation, too. He drives a GMC Sierra truck with hand controls. His second car is a Jeep Grand Cherokee.

Mr. Lavender's goal is to educate people about the ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act). I don't know about the other students in that class, but I learned a lot from him.

He is also a very athletic man. He had a motorcycle accident in 1985 that rendered his legs useless. Mr. Lavender water and snow skis. He plays ice hockey. He hand cycles. He loves to fish. He even participates in half marathons. He's been racing since 1990. His racing chair is really light. He told us that racing chairs run from \$2000 on up. The titanium chairs are \$4000!

He may not be able to walk, but he can do just about everything else.

Mr. Lavender trains in a subdivision in Tupelo. He trains with a hand cycle that has 18 gears. This is a man who wasn't into sports at all before his accident. He said he had no reason to be. Now, he is a very multidimensional athlete.
